Environmental Report

I'm sitting here thinking about how Christmas affects our environment. There are many things, but one thing I can't help thinking about is the debate between a real/live tree versus an artificial tree. The debate has been going on for many years, and this year is no exception. For most of my life a real tree was the only way to go and nothing else would do. A trip to the mountains with family, you know the hunt for that perfect tree. The smell of the tree in the house over the holiday can't be beat. We always looked for a tree that was about ten-foot-tall, that was not too thin and sturdy enough to hold a lot of ornaments. Sometimes this could take a day or two of looking for that perfect tree. So after years and much debate, we decided an artificial tree would be the best for us. Yes, we miss the smell of the real tree and the thrill of the hunt. We've saved a lot of time searching for that perfect tree, not to mention all the spiders that seem to come with a real tree and all the needles on the floor. One factor in our decision was how long the tree is up each year. We like having it up for the whole holiday season, but you know a month or so in the house is a bit much for a real tree.

could have been a disaster

Last weekend, when we were exiting Gig Harbor, we noticed that one of our yacht club members was having mechanical trouble. We went to give assistance. Since they could not get the motor restarted, we decided to give them a tow. After we got our tow lines in place, the captain was standing on the bow of the boat while under tow. I asked him to get his life jacket and at least sit down. He would not get his life jacket but did sit down, so we continued to tow them. The water was pretty calm until we got to the Narrows around the bridge then there were four foot seas and strong SW wind. I watched their boat through the rough water with him sitting on the bow. By now it was too rough for him to go back in the boat. We did make it back to Day Island Yacht Club safely.

We did not think about anything except helping our friends. We should have tied up next to the boat to stabilize it until Vessel Assist arrived to do the towing.

Deciding to tow instead of waiting for Vessel Assist, I should have insisted that we were not going anywhere until he got his life jacket on, went into the cabin and stayed there until we got to Day Island. I have been thinking about this quite a bit since and the awful consequences if he had fallen off the bow of his boat. There would have been no way to save him. Thank God all are safe!

I had a member request a recipe for meat loaf that could be sliced without crumbling for sandwiches. I went to my best resource, Chef Brian, and asked if he had such a recipe in his vast archives. Sure enough, he did. The secret to keeping the meat loaf firm for slicing is not to include things like green peppers or fresh onions when preparing it which cause it to break apart.

MEAT LOAF

- 1 pound ground sausage
- 1 pound ground beef
- 3 eggs
- 1-1/4 cup Panko
- 6 oz. tomato paste
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 2 Tbsp. beef base
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 Tbsp. Italian seasoning
- 3 Tbsp. dry chopped onion
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. garlic powder

- 3 Tbsp. ketchup to top

Mix all ingredients together, except ketchup, until well combined. Place into well-greased loaf pan. Cook in oven at 325 degrees until core temperature of 160 degrees, about 60 minutes. After about 45 minutes of cooking time, spread the ketchup over the top and place back in oven. When done, let cool 10 minutes before slicing.
