Our Grandson, Garret, was on Spring Break last week, and I thought it would be great if he could stay with us for a few days. A phone call to my son and with my grandson's approval, we had a date. I was to drive to Port Townsend and pick him up on

Thursday, and he would spend the weekend with us on our boat gong to Longbranch Marina for a rendezvous with the Squadron. We all packed everything to get ready, and Garret was getting pretty excited. I turned the VHF on and listened to the weather report, sounded like we could be in for some wind in the late afternoon. We decided to get going fairly early taking into consideration. The tides in the Narrows, tides, and currents showed we would be good leaving about 0900 as the slack before the flood was at 1030. Ok, so here we are on the boat ready to shove off and a last check of the weather before we go. Now they are saying the wind window has moved up and should be starting about 0900. We had better get going if we're going to be ahead of it coming in. As we shoved off, there was a slight breeze, nothing to worry about, pretty typical for us in April. As we moved across Commencement Bay toward Point Defiance, the wind picked up slightly, and we had 1'-2' chop.

Now Garret was getting uneasy as he hasn't been out with us on the boat since he was too small to remember. Cindy told me he was upset and maybe we should turn around and go back or go to Dock Street for the weekend. I said everything would be good and I wanted to go to the rendezvous. We are about 45 minutes out and at Point Defiance getting ready to make the turn into Colvoes Passage towards the Narrows when our port engine shut down. Cindy took the helm, and I went down to the engine room and switched to a new filter. I came up and started the engine up, and unfortunately it shut down once again. Ok, so at this point I'm not sure what part of my brain said go ahead, you still have one good engine. I made the turn, and we headed towards the Narrows Bridge with the wind picking up considerably at this point with $2^{2} - 3^{2}$ chop, wind blowing on our bow and the tide flooding from our stern we pushed on. The wind speed was increasing, and it was getting a little rough, and by the time we made the bridge I'm pretty sure wind waves were 5' - 6.' With the occasional rogue one that slammed us hard enough to make you clench your teeth. I was pretty busy keeping us going straight and headed in the right direction. I wasn't paying attention to Cindy & Garett, but they were holding hands, and they were sitting in the chairs to stay put. Everything seemed to be doing ok as far as the boat concerns go, she was taking the beating much better than it's occupants. At McNeal Island, we started our turn to starboard into

Balch Passage for the last 3.5-mile leg to Filucy Bay. That corner was a little harsh as now the wind, and of course, the waves are now becoming abeam of us making for that uneasy feeling, but some zig zag course changes smoothed that out and now that we're in the Lee of Anderson Island, things were almost calm considering what we just came through. With Filucy Bay in sight, we had it made only a few more unpleasant minutes, and we'd be home free and docked at Longbranch. I know you know the saying "Don't count your chickens before they hatch." Well, you guessed it at the point at the end of Anderson Island we started smelling smoke and slightly seeing it. A quick check of the engine room showed nothing, the gauges all looked good and still smelling it we decided to shut down the generator and diesel heater and see if that was the cause. It seemed to stop, and we continued towards Longbranch. Now we're leaving the protection of the island and those pesky winds coming from Southeast were at our beam once again, stronger than before. Now here is the scary part, I can't get the boat to respond to the rudder, and with only the starboard engine we just keep turning toward port. After many attempts, I was ready to hold her into the wind and call Vessel Assist to get us out of this jam. Then a call on the VHF radio from the Tacoma Power Squadron, they could see us and wanted to know if everything was ok. I told them the situation, and they said they would be right there. I asked if they were sure because it was pretty nasty out here. One of our members, Tim Craig brought his 16' skiff with a 70 hp with him on the trip. So here they come, three of them in the boat heading (kind of) straight for us. Waves were probably between 4' - 6', and I'm trying to keep the boat into the wind. Although it took a few tries, Geoff Ringstad managed to get on board and put some lines together and threw a tow bridle to the skiff. Todd Mackey caught and secured the tow line (no easy feat by anyone); they were able to pull my heavy 42' boat safely to the marina dock. Everyone met us and made us feel much better after that ride. And even Garret started calming down with some cajoling by Linda Craig and Nancy Ringstad, we thank you. After a nice dinner and some talk about what had happened, it was nice to be among good Friends safe and sound. As for the smoke, we think it was just the exhaust coming in from the stern because of the way the wind and direction headed. The cabin was a pile of items from the counter that hadn't moved in the 18 years we have owned the boat, but only a couple things broke. Next day Todd Mackey helped bleed the port engine, and I changed all fuel filters and took Fascination for a spin just to make sure everything was ok. We'll need a few new items replaced because of the beam seas, and the radar mast mount will need to be remanufactured. But outside of that a very memorable weekend. Our Heartfelt Thanks go ---to all our friends who helped and made us feel safe. Our Hero's!



The member volunteers and guest presenters for Engine Maintenance are working well, but we miss our engine guru, Mark Hafterson, when we are talking about engines.

After recent meetings with Gene Anderson with Pt. Defiance Boat House, we are planning to teach the Paddle Smart Seminar (approximately 2 hours) to Pt. Defiance customers who wish to go out with paddle craft. We would do a session Saturday June 3rd, 2017 at 10:00 AM, and Saturday July 8th, 2017 at 10:00 AM. The Tacoma Power Squadron is being asked to do the classroom seminar on Paddle Smart (approximately 2 hrs), and the Point Defiance Boat House staff will do hands on practical demonstrations with the paddle craft, at Owen's Beach following the classroom sessions. New Hull Identification Numbers ?

The Washington State Department of Licensing is required to comply with Coast Guard regulations requiring that all state titled vessels have a 12-character hull identification number (HIN) that conforms to federal standards. Many vessels have HINs that do not conform to the newer standards. New HINs can be obtained at a Vehicle Licensing Office at no charge. The new numbers will need to be permanently affixed to your vessel as per regulations. You should receive a letter from the Department of Licensing if your vessel HIN is out of compliance. Our inflatable dingy (Lance and Brenda) which was manufactured out of the USA does not have a compliant HIN.

NOTE: Remember to notify your Marine Insurance Company if your HIN does change.

No-Discharge Zone (NDZ): With encouragement from the State Senator (Doug Ericksen, R-Ferndale/42nd Dist), members of the Marine Alliance are submitting a formal request to have the Regional EPA's hasty, last-second "confirmation" of adequate commercial sewage pump-out facilities being in place to support a Puget Sound-wide NDZ. As the commercial pump out station in Bellingham is the only existing commercial pump out station in Puget Sound that is **NOT** a private or restricted facility (owned by either a cruise line or the military), we believe the case for getting a favorable reconsideration is a very strong one.

Hull Identification Number (HIN) Registration/Reporting Changes: Discussions with the Department of Licensing (DOL) on this one continued. We learned of a pending U.S. Coast Guard rule-making that will cause a significant upheaval for all those who sell, trade, register, or re-register vessels. The rule-making would change a longtime practice of having manufacturer-designated HINs be the numbers that are recorded with all vessel transactions, registrations, sales, and trade-ins.

Boating Safety legislation – SB 5442/HB 1604; HB 1605; SSB 5552/SHB 1731: All of these RBAW-supported bills are on the move. The bills repeal outdated language in the Boater Education Card statutes, allows law enforcement – as a last resort – to impound vessels when operators are impaired and would exempt flare guns used by boaters from having to go through a "weapons" background check.

Retaining Boating Facilities Program (BFP) funding in the Capital Budget: We continue to talk with various members of the Senate Ways & Means and House Capital Budget Committees on this. The BFP will have \$17.166 million in it for 2017-19 due to new gas tax proceeds coming into the State Treasury. That funding level makes the program a potential 'target' for diversion of funds, similar to what happened a few years ago.

Multi-year Vessel Registration: A bill relating to increasing the registration period of automobile registrations to two years in length has been introduced. A recent amendment to this bill would make that option also available to vessel registrations as well. This provision is currently written into the legislation as an option that the vehicle/vessel owner may choose during their renewal process. RBAW will monitor this bill, with news to follow as this proceeds through the legislature.
